Isaiah 52 – Context and Prelude

God's Servant the Messiah

- There are five Servant Songs in Isaiah.
- We have seen Him as God's ideal servant, redeemer of Israel and the world, rejected by the world, but assured victory through Jehovah's power.
- Our focus today is the fourth, known as the song of the suffering Servant Isa. 52:13 53:12
- Here He is a conquering hero through suffering, not as a warrior.
- We will consider the context and prelude to the suffering Servant.

The Context

Isaiah 52:1-12

Context: Israel's Exaltation

- Israel is called to awake and take her place of honor in Jerusalem – 52:1-6
 - She must rise from her stupor and put on God's strength and beautiful garments, being freed – 52:1-2; Col. 2:11; Rom. 2:28-29
 - God would redeem her without money 52:3-6; 1 Pet. 1:18
- Glad tidings of redemption and deliverance would come, bringing joy and comfort, while demanding holiness of God's people – 52:7-12; Rom. 10:14-15; 2 Cor. 6:15-18

Prelude to the Suffering Servant

Isaiah 52:13-15

The Prelude:

His Exaltation and Suffering

- The servant's exaltation comes first, followed by suffering (reversed from Isa. 53) 52:13-15
- By acting in wisdom, Jehovah will cause Him to rise to great honor 52:13; Phil. 2:8-11
- This exaltation would come through great cost 52:14-15
 - He would be subjected to the basest treatment and severest suffering – 52:14
 - Through suffering He would *sprinkle* the nations 52:15; Heb. 10:19-22; 2 Cor. 1:6-10
