



What is a Sponsoring Church?

Sponsoring Church

Defined: Lewis G. Hale


"There are churches known as 'sponsoring churches.' Feeling that they are not financially able to carry on a certain program single-handedly, they invite sister congregations to share the expense of that work. They receive funds from other churches and add these to whatever funds they themselves provide for the work and they become wholly responsible for the oversight of the work." (How Churches Can Cooperate, God's Work In God's Way, p. 3)

Sponsoring Church

Defined: J. D. Thomas


"Sponsoring Church Arrangement: One congregation that especially oversees a project, such as a mission activity, in which other congregations have an interest and to which they voluntarily contribute regularly....The fact that other churches contribute to a project that is overseen by the elders of one church is the central idea." (We Be Brethren, p. 255)

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Sponsoring Church

David Lipscomb

 "All meetings of churches or officers of churches to combine more power than a single church possesses is wrong. God's power is in God's churches. He is with them to bless and strengthen their work when they are faithful to him...But for one or more to direct what and how all the churches shall work, or to take charge of their men and money and use it, is to assume the authority God has given to each church. Each one needs the work of distributing and using its funds as well as in giving them." (Gospel Advocate, March 24, 1910)

Sponsoring Church

1940s: The Sponsoring Church Takes Hold

- The SC became prominent after WWII.
- Broadway church of Christ in Lubbock, TX, assumed oversight of all efforts to evangelize Germany and sought funds from churches of Christ.
- Union Avenue church of Christ in Memphis, TN, assumed oversight of all evangelistic efforts in Japan.

Sponsoring Church Defended

- The Great Commission requires us to preach the gospel to every person in every place on earth
- There is no local church on earth that can do this alone
- Therefore, churches of Christ must pool their resources to fulfill the Great Commission

Sponsoring Church Defended

- Therefore it is the responsibility of each church to preach the gospel as far and wide as her resources will allow.
- There is the can do this alone
- Therefore, churches of Christ must pool their resource fulfill the Great Commission

The gospel was preached to the whole world in the first century (Col. 1:6, 23) and the churches didn't pool their resources to do it.

Sponsoring Church

The Issue Was and Is...

- Must we follow the N.T. pattern for preaching the gospel?
- May a local church choose to take upon itself a work larger than it can support, and to which all churches are equally responsible, and become dependent on other churches to fund this work?
- May churches do their work through a sponsoring church?
- May the elders of one church oversee any part of the work of other churches?

False Premise:


The Body of Christ can Act as One under a Sponsoring Church's Eldership



False Concept and Premise:

The Foundation of Roman Catholicism

- Roman refers to the church located at Rome.
- Catholic refers to the world-wide body of Christ, believed to be made up of Catholic churches scattered throughout the world.
- The Roman Catholic Church is claimed to be the body of Christ functioning as one through the oversight of the church at Rome.

Is Not Authorized in the N.T.


Without Authority


- There is no express statement, direct command, approved example, nor inescapable conclusion authorizing the sponsoring church arrangement.
- Mark Roberts: "The most basic objection to this sponsoring church arrangement was, and remains, that there is simply nothing said in scripture of churches ever being pulled together into such an arrangement. There is no pattern for this harness, no provision for how it is to be managed, or who is to oversee it. There is no 'book, chapter, and verse' for the sponsoring church arrangement." ("Mutual Fund Christianity," Abundant Life, Oct., 1996, 29:10:4)

The Creation of Man

- No church ever assumed oversight of a work beyond its ability.
- Opportunity (Gal. 6:10) + Ability (Acts 11:29) =
 Responsibility (2 Cor. 8:12)
- E. R. Harper: "A congregation has no right to build anything larger than it is able to support. It has no right whatever to bind any other congregation to any program of work of its own selection. Each congregation must retain its autonomy. Any effort that destroys the independence of a local congregation runs straight toward sectarianism, if not Romanism." (via Britnell, "The Sponsoring Church," p. 2)

Sponsoring Church Violates Eldership Limitations

Biblical Elders

- Every local church is to work to appoint elders to oversee its affairs.
 - Elders are to be established in every church Acts 14:23;
 Titus 1:5
 - Each eldership must meet the same qualifications Titus 1:6-9; 1 Tim. 3:1-7
 - Each eldership's oversight is **limited** to the **flock of God** which is among them 1 Peter 5:1-3
- All elderships are equally qualified and equally limited in their scope of oversight and responsibilities.

Sponsoring Church Oversteps Eldership Limitations

Larger than a Local Church

- A sponsoring church eldership assumes oversight over a work larger than the local church.
 - This is the point and design of the sponsoring church. It unites churches together to do a work far larger than one local church can do!
 - A One Nation Under God flyer proved this when it claimed, "Christians deserve the opportunity to participate in something bigger than a budget, larger than the local work." ("Four Months Until the Deadline")
 - Who is biblically *qualified* to oversee this? 1 Pet. 5:1-3

Sponsoring Church Oversteps Eldership Limitations

A Work of "churches of Christ"

- The Herald of Truth was the work of hundreds of churches acting under the oversight of the Highland church of Christ eldership.
- James W. Nichols: "It is the largest radio efforts ever attempted by the *churches* of Christ. The entire work is under the supervision of the elders of the Highland Church, Abilene, Texas." (*Preachers of Today*, 1952)
- Where does the N.T. give a local eldership the right to oversee the work of more than one church? – Acts 14:23; 1 Pet. 5:1-3

Conclusion

- The sponsoring church arrangement has no biblical authority.
- There is no authority for...
 - A local church to sponsor a work beyond its ability to support and seek money from other churches to pay for it
 - Many churches working through one church
 - Elders overseeing the work of more than one church
