Romans 9:1-5 Israel is Lost in their Rejection of Jesus

## Paul's Heartbreak over Israel – 9:1-5

- Paul mourned for his countrymen—Israelites in the flesh—for their rejection of Jesus as the Christ 9:1-3; Mt. 23:37; Rom. 10:1-4
  - Paul would have given up his salvation if Israel (nation) would be saved.
  - Paul mourned their lost condition in rejecting the Christ 10:1-4
- The tragedy of their lost condition is heightened by the fact of their once having a covenant relationship with Christ – 9:4-5
  - The Israelites had been adopted and blessed as God's children.
  - This being so, why were so many Jews lost??

Romans 9:6-9 God's Word Hadn't Failed

### Not All Israel is True Israel

- God's word to the Jews hasn't failed because not all *Israel* (of the flesh) is the *true Israel* (of God) 9:6; 2:28-29; 3:3-4
- Proof of the above assertion is presented in God's choice of the children of Abraham – 9:7-9
  - Being the physical lineage of Abraham doesn't make Israel the children of promise—Isaac was chosen over Ishmael – 9:7; Lk. 3:8-9
  - God can choose that being children of the flesh does not make them children of God – 9:8-9; Gen. 21:14-21

Romans 9:10-13

God's choice of Jacob over Esau had nothing to do with their works!

### God's Choice of Israel: "Not of Works"

- Calvinists depart from the <u>context</u> by applying these analogies to individuals being foreordained to unconditional salvation – 9:1-9, 30-32
- God's choice of Jacob over Esau shows Israel had no gripe that God chose to save apart from *works of the law* – 9:10-13
  - God chose Jacob over Esau with no consideration of their deeds 9:10-11
  - God's choice overrode what man's might see as fair 9:12-13
  - Why God did this is because Israel did not keep the Law and was condemned as sinners Rom. 3:23

# Calvinists' Objections

- Did not God arbitrarily determine before they were born that the elder would serve the younger, showing unconditional election? – 9:10-12
  - This quote is taken from Gen. 25:23 and concerns how God chose that the *nation* of Esau would serve the *nation* of Israel.
  - The choice had nothing to do with unconditional salvation or condemnation, but *national* power.
  - This example was used to show that God has the right to determine to save *spiritual Israel of faith in Christ* over *unbelieving Israel of the works of the law!*

# Calvinists' Objections

- Did not God arbitrarily determine to <u>love</u> Jacob and <u>hate</u> Esau *before they did any good or bad*, proving salvation is determined unconditionally? – 9:13
  - This quote is taken from Malachi 1:1-5 and also concerned the fate of the **nation** of Esau (Edom) and the **nation** of Jacob (Israel).
  - That God **loved** Jacob and **hated** Esau should not be assumed to be by eternal decree and before they showed their character Heb. 12:15; Joel 3:19; Amos 1:11; Lk. 14:26
