RESPONDING CORRECTLY TO THE TRUTH

Importance of Truth

The Spirit's work was to reveal the truth – Jn. 16:13-14.

Sanctification comes through the truth – Jn. 17:17, 19

Purification comes by obeying the truth – 1 Pet. 1:22

Being set free comes through knowing the truth – Jn. 8:31-32

A holy life requires practicing the truth – Jn. 3:20-21

Acceptable worship is done in truth – Jn. 4:24

WHAT DOES THE TRUTH REQUIRE?

Saul

- ◆ Lived this way despite persecuting Christians and blaspheming –
 Acts 7:57-58, 8:3, 26:9-11; 1 Tim. 1:12-13
- Was confronted with the truth that he persecuted Jesus the Christ

 Acts 9:3-6
- What did Saul have to do? Obey! Acts 9:8-9; 22:14-16; 1
 Pet. 3:21
- Responding correctly to the truth requires obedience despite one having a good conscience and facing hardship

Peter

- Was confronted with the truth that salvation is not limited to the Jews – Acts 10:9-16
- Was commanded to go with Gentiles "without misgivings" –
 10:17-20
- Responding correctly to the truth requires obedience even when the truth is contrary to what you have believed you whole life!

Apollos

- Was a knowledgeable and capable preacher of Christ, but taught error concerning baptism – Acts 18:24-25; Mt. 18:18-20
- Was confronted with the truth concerning baptism 18:26
- What did Apollos have to do? Accept the truth and change! –
 1 Tim. 4:16
- Responding correctly to the truth requires obedience even when it is just one issue—even when that issue is baptism!

The Disciples at Ephesus

- Paul found disciples and asked about whether they received the Spirit when they believed – Acts 19:1-3
 - There was a problem with their baptism—it was John's baptism
 - John's baptism looked in the wrong direction concerning salvation Acts 19:4; Rom. 6:3-4
- What did these disciple have to do? Obey and be re-baptized –
 Acts 19:5-6
- Responding correctly to the truth requires being re-baptized in order to act in truth and be saved.

What about the Truth and Baptism Today?

Truth and Baptism Today?

- Most denominational baptism is for saved people and believed to be a sign of their past salvation.
- The problem, like John's baptism, is that their baptism looks in the opposite direction concerning salvation than does N.T. baptism.
- "Baptism then, is not an "option" for the believer in Christ but it is an Just as John's baptism wrongfully looked forward to a coming Savior who ordinance... These ordinances are sympols setting forth divine truth. They are not sacraments, that is, saving acts, conveying grace. They do not have salvation bower to save or to add to salvation. Rather they are external testimony to the "union with Christ" which has already taken place... Baptism is true baptism only if the person baptized has already been saved." ("Baptizing Them In The Name..."; Baptist tract by Robert E. Naylor)

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N.T. Baptism is Performed to...

- Save you 1 Pet. 3:21
- Bring you into Christ Rom. 6:3; Gal. 3:27
- Receive forgiveness of your sins Acts 2:38; Acts 22:16
- Bury you with Christ so you can be raised with Christ Rom.
 6:4; Col. 2:12
- If you were not baptized for these reasons, to correctly respond to the truth requires that you obey by being baptized or rebaptized for these reasons – Heb. 5:8-9
